Top 5 Things Employers Should Do Before An Injury Occurs

1/ Maintain A Safe Workplace

This is obvious but important. A culture of safety should pervade your workplace. One great way to do this is to incentivize employees who maintain good safety records.

2/ Put Formal Safety Policies And Procedures In Place

Your company handbook should list steps that must take place to prevent accidents. Make sure these policies are well known and enforced.

3/ Promote A Healthy Workplace

Providing regular breaks, good medical benefits, and promoting healthy lifestyles are essential in creating a healthy and balanced workplace leading to less workers' compensation claims.

4/ Hire A Safety Coordinator

It is important to have an employee responsible for safety. Provide that employee with the tools to create a safe work environment.

5/ Know The Law

Be aware of OSHA regulations and updates.

The Illinois gubernatorial race is quickly heating up and we can expect to hear the candidates talking a lot about workers' compensation reform as a way to help fix Illinois. As the campaign progresses we will

continue to provide updates regarding any specific proposals and its potential effect on the WC system.

On the Republican side, incumbent Governor, Bruce Rauner, will face a primary challenge from State Representative Jeanne Ives. It is expected that Governor Rauner will become the nominee for the Republicans.

The Democrats have a much larger field including Daniel Biss, Chris Kennedy and J.B. Pritzker. Kennedy and Pritzker are the main two contenders based on name recognition and campaign war chests.

SOUND BITE: Cornell Law School Vice Dean and Professor <u>Jens David Ohlin</u> discusses the ongoing Mueller investigation.

Rich Lenkov: Supporters of Trump are saying he never had the power to fire Mueller. Opponents of the president say that even if he didn't have the power to fire Mueller, if he believed that he did and he took actions to further that belief, then that is a prosecutable case of obstruction of justice. Thoughts?

Professor Ohlin: I think that his attempted firing of Mueller calling Don McGahn, the White House Counsel and directing him to try and dismiss Mueller, I think that that's a very weak obstruction of justice case by itself. I think what it does though is it could be background evidence in support of an obstruction of justice case regarding the firing of Jim Comey. I think that's very much the strong case.

Rich Lenkov: Why would that not in and of itself be enough for obstruction of justice?

Professor Ohlin: First of all, it was a mere attempt, an incoed at most because he didn't actually succeed in firing Mueller, he simply spoke to McCann who basically pushed back and then Trump thought better of it. If Trump has actually overruled McGahn concerns and said 'I understand but I want to go ahead with it' to me sounds a lot like an internal deliberation between confidants. Trump expressed his opinion and then McCann expressed his opinion and Trump didn't move forward with it. So directly I don't think the Mueller firing is a strong obstruction case.

Early Bird Gets Nothing

In Stewart v. Village of Lincolnwood (25 ILWCLB 181), the arbitrator awarded benefits to an off-duty police officer that collided her motorcycle with a stationary fork utility vehicle in Respondent's parking lot. On appeal, the Commission reversed the arbitrator's decision for 2 reasons.

First, the Commission found that Petitioner was not in the course of her employment at the time of the alleged accident as she was an hour early before work. The Commission reasoned that arriving an hour before work was unreasonable and that Petitioner failed to prove that Respondent benefited from her early arrival.

Second, Petitioner's accident did not arise out of her employment as there was no causal connection between her injuries and a hazardous condition of the parking lot. Specifically, the Commission found that Petitioner's injuries stemmed from her personal actions and not an employment related-risk as she struck a stationary object and her path was unobstructed. Therefore, the Commission denied benefits.

Practice Tip:

Being on the premises/parking lot does not mean an injury should be accepted.

Employees Are Not Rewarded For Being "Stressed"

In *Bumphus v. Unique Personnel Consultants*, 25 ILWCLB 189 (III. W.C. Comm. 2017), the Commission denied benefits to a petitioner who alleged that he was mentally disabled because he was denied an accommodation at work.

Petitioner reported that he had a rod and two pins due to a prior unrelated injury and requested that he refrain from lifting at work. Although Petitioner corroborated his prior injury with medical records, Respondent denied his request. As a result, Petitioner alleged that he sustained stress and anxiety due to bullying and duplicity but failed to present any evidence of a psychological work-related condition.

On appeal, the Commission affirmed the arbitrator's decision and denied benefits as Petitioner failed to prove that he suffered a sudden, definite event. The Commission reasoned that Petitioner's alleged interactions with his co-workers were normal and that it did not rise above a day-to-day strain and tension.


Practice Tip:

Petitioner must prove *sudden, severe* and *emotional* distress when evaluating mental claims.
