Top 5 Things That Petitioner's Attorneys Tell You That You Should Question

1/ "My client is still treating"

This is probably the most common response I hear from opposing counsel as to why they can't settle a case. Often, it's simply not true. Generally, people who are being treated actually see doctors. If you get this response from opposing counsel, ask them to prove it by producing recent medical records.

2/"This is my bottom line"

The truth is, there is no such thing as a real bottom line. If an attorney is motivated to settle a case, there is always room for negotiation. Remember: <u>you</u> have the ultimate leverage, money.

3/"There is no subrogation potential"

Don't rely on opposing counsel to tell you whether there is any third-party liability for which you may recover. Petitioner's counsel may not know very much about personal injury law, or simply may not have the time to investigate it. Do your own independent investigation to determine whether there is any possibility of recovering your lien.

4/ "This is a case that we have to try"

Nonsense. There is no such thing as a case that you have to try, only cases where the parties have not tried hard enough to settle. We settle all kinds of cases, big and small, even in the face of obstacles like when Petitioner is still treating. That said, it's true on our side that there are some cases that we simply have to take a hard line on and try.

5/"I'll call you back soon"

Self-explanatory.

SB 904 is still awaiting a decision from Gov. Rauner. We expect the decision on 8/29/2018. This bill would increase the interest penalty from 1% to 2% if a medical bill is paid after 30 days. It would also allow the provider a private cause of action in circuit

Talk Is Cheap: Why Simply Testifying Is Not Enough

In Holland v. Murray Developmental Center, 26 ILWCLB 84 (III. W.C. Comm. 2017), the Illinois Workers' Compensation Commission (IWCC) excluded Petitioner's overtime from her average weekly wage calculation.

At trial, Petitioner showed that she worked overtime every week that she worked, aside from one.

Petitioner testified that approximately 50% of the overtime that she worked was mandatory. The arbitrator included Petitioner's overtime in calculating her AWW.

The IWCC overturned the arbitration finding and excluded Petitioner's overtime from her AWW. The IWCC stated that Petitioner failed to prove her overtime was consistent and required by her employer. The IWCC pointed to the fact that Petitioner offered no evidence to support her testimony, and was unable to show which hours on her wage statement were in fact mandatory.

Practice Tip:

Unrebutted testimony, on its own, is not enough to establish that overtime is mandatory.

Nice Guys Finish Last

In *Tangen v. Verizon Wireless*, 26 ILWCLB 81 (III. W.C. Comm. 2017), the Illinois Workers' Compensation Commission denied all benefits after finding that Petitioner's accident did not occur in the course and scope of his employment.

Petitioner, a store manager for Verizon Wireless, agreed to cover a shift for a co-worker whose car

would not start on a day that Petitioner was not scheduled to work. While driving from home to work that day, Petitioner was involved in a motor vehicle accident.

At trial, Petitioner argued that he faced greater risks traveling to work on a day when he was not scheduled to work. The arbitrator found that the fact that Petitioner drove to work on a day he was not scheduled to work did not expose him to a greater risk than traveling to his place of employment on a day he was scheduled to work. Consequently, the arbitrator found that

Petitioner's accident did not arise out of and in the course of his employment and denied all benefits.

On Petitioner's appeal, the Commission affirmed.

Practice Tip:

Accidents that occur while commuting to and from work do not arise out of and in the course of employment, and should be denied, regardless of the circumstances.


